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



**Stuart Grant Murray-**Deployed on Eternal patrol on January 17, 2022. Born on May 12, 1922, Stuart was the eldest son of



ADM Stuart Shadrick Murray USN and Madeleine Young Murray. He joined the Naval Reserves at 17 and went through flight training school before the age of 20. Stuart graduated with a degree in Electrical Engineering from the United States Naval Academy class of 1947. Former President Jimmy Carter was a classmate. While at Annapolis, Stuart was his brigade's Heavyweight boxing champion. Upon graduation, Stuart circled

the globe on a destroyer, then entered Naval Submarine School in New London in 1948. Upon graduation. he was assigned to the USS BECUNA. Among his other assignments he was the Engineering and Navigation Officer aboard the USS JALLAO, Executive Officer aboard the USS BANG. He served 27 years in the Navy and retired in 1966 with the rank of Lieutenant Commander. After retirement from the Navy, Stuart worked 20 years analyzing submarine warfare for private contractors such as CONRAC, Litton, and General Electric. After retiring from General Electric, Stuart launched a radon testing company and was a manger of an H&R local office in Gales Ferry CT.

Thomas L. Burnett, Jr. –Departed on Eternal Patrol on May 3. 2021 at home. Tom was born in Pittsburgh, PA on December 25th to Thomas and Elizabeth Burnett Sr. He served on submarines in the United States Navy for 23 years, as well as Signature Flight Support for over 20 years. Tom served as a Torpedoman's Mate Third Class on the BANG from 1961-63.





Edward Henry (Ed) Kracker—Our shipmate Ed departed on Eternal Patrol on February 6, 2022. He served in the Navy from 1942 to 1964. He was a plank owner of the BANG and qualified in 1944, and was a veteran of War Patrols 1,2,3,4, and 5. In addition to the BANG, he also served on United States Submarines POMPON SS 486, CHIVO SS 341 and CHOPPER SS342. He retired from the Navy as a CWO2. Ed made it clear that he did not want any ceremony at his passing and plans are being coordinated to have a burial at sea. There are two sure things in life, Franklin once said, "death and Taxes". One could add a third, "that Ed and his beloved wife

June Kracker would be present at a BANG reunion." Ed would often be found holding court at a hospitality room table at the reunion, ready to talk to all present and impart any sea story that came to mind. I think the best recollection of Ed was during the reunion in New London. After a tour of the Submarine School, Ed spoke to a group of students about life in the "Pig Boats" during WWII and what it felt like to be depth charged for hours on end. One instructor said he had never seen a group of students so mesmerized in all his years at Sub School. But that was Ed.





## THE LUCKY BAG

#### Dear Shipmates, spouses, and friends,

As you can see, and have read, this issue is mainly about the upcoming reunion. Seeing that this is also the third time we've gone through this exercise, a lot of it may seem redundant. However, I just want to make sure we are all up to speed, and it may be new to some of our newly rediscovered shipmates, who we all hope will be coming to the festivities. So here is a quick rundown of what to expect.

I picked Washington DC, (it seems eons ago) because it is our Nation's Capital and it would be nice to see the many Naval themed attractions that are there. Little did I realize that a world wide pandemic and a little extracurricular disturbance would cause an almost three year hiatus. I also picked it because it is quite easy to get to. As an example:

Our hotel is one stop on the Metro from Reagan National, it is also a quick cab ride away. It is also right off I-95 if you are driving, and finally Union station, if you coming in by Amtrak, is again just a short cab ride away. Washington Dulles Airport is also nearby but necessitates a couple of stops and changes on the Metro, and is a little more expensive by cab. I'd opt for Reagan if you're flying in. The Doubletree is in Crystal City, which is close by to many restaurants and shopping. It also means we won't be spending an inordinate amount of time on the tour bus. Speaking of the hotel, like many hotels in large cities, there is a parking fee on site. We had one in New Orleans. The fee at the Double Tree is usually \$49.00/ per day, however the hotel has given us a greatly reduced price of \$15.00/ per day. As I mentioned in the earlier FPO page, there is so much to see in DC that one week is never enough, in fact one can spend a month there and not see everything. I'd serious consider extending your stay by a couple days at either end to get the full experience. The hop on-hop off tour of the Mall is, in my opinion, the best one day tour in the country. The Smithsonian Museum, and all its sections, is another must see venue. Especially if your kids or grand-kids are coming along.

So, make your hotel reservations now, and don't forget to mention that you are with the USS BANG group. I honestly think this will be one of the best reunions we've had in a long time. We all know we are ready for one. The next Newsletter will have more detailed info on getting around DC and what you need to know about some of our tour stops.

Finally, I came across an expression the other day that I've heard, it seems, a thousand times. It was the oft mentioned "when one door closes, another one opens."
