instead of just the WWII vets as was in previous years. The response was so over-whelming that the restriction stayed off permanently and the 'Bang Gang' organization was born. I can honestly say that without that decision being made back then, you would not be reading this Newsletter today.

Bob again volunteered to co-hosted another successful Reunion in Groton 2001. And, again, made it special by sending personal invitations to all the Skippers of BANG requesting their attendance. And they responded in the affirmative.

Bob's love for BANG and his shipmates made he and wife, Barbara, regular attendees of all our Reunions until recently when his illness restricted his ability to travel.



Robert A. Jutstrom Sr., of Mashpee, Mass, formerly of Weymouth, passed away on Dec. 13, 2009, after a lengthy illness. He was the beloved husband of Barbara J. (Donaldson) Jutstrom of Arlington for 64 years. Bob was born in Coos Bay, Ore.,

in 1923, and graduated from Marshfield High School in 1941.

During World War II, he served on the submarine USS BANG (SS

385) for five war patrols in Japanese waters. After the war, Bob was advanced to chief engineman in the Naval Reserve. He had graduated from both Wentworth Institute and Northeastern University, cum laude.

In addition to his wife Barbara, he is survived by his children, Robert Jr. and wife Christine of Waltham, Deborah Parker and husband Edward of Greenwich, Conn., and Karen Desantis of Worcester. Also surviving are six grandchildren.

Mr. Jutstrom worked for the New England Electric System for 38 years as an electrical engineer in the Meter and Communication division. He was well known nationally for his many years of work on the NFPA National Electrical Code. He was chairman of the Code Panel on Electrical Services for more than 15 years.

In 1986, he permanently moved from Weymouth to his home in Mashpee, which he built in 1971. While in Mashpee, he was a very active member of Christ the King Church. He was also an active member of the U.S. Submarine Veterans WWII, Mass Bay State East Charter. Bob was a life member of the Weymouth Sportsmen's Club, and also a member of the Mashpee Men's Club. He was an avid fisherman and had fished in 15 states and Canada. Once he said, "That his 67-day fishing trip, on a 34-foot trawler with his lifelong friend, Dewey Wilson, traveling 3,700 miles on the water from Coos Bay, Ore., to Glacier Bay, Alaska, and return; was a present from his loving wife Barbara."

A funeral Mass was celebrated on Friday, Dec. 18, 2009, at Christ the King Church, Mashpee, followed by burial at Massachusetts National Cemetery in Bourne.

Jim Warden was another of BANG's plank owners who served his country well. Years ago he sent me a poem that he wrote in 1945 after he had left BANG. As you will read in his obituary, like most of us, Jim was a peace loving man who loved his country.



James E.S. Warden, 92, of Ballston Lake, NY died unexpectedly at home on Monday, January 11, 2010.

Born in Washington, DC on December 12, 1917, the son of Horace and Mary Warden, James graduated from Riverdale Country Day School, and MIT with a degree in engineering. He served in

World War II as a lieutenant on submarine USS BANG (SS 385) and successfully made four war patrols in the South Pacific. He received the Bronze Star for meritorious service.

James was employed at GE as a manager with KAPL for 24 years and was construction manager of the West Milton Site. He started and was president of Tri Nuclear Corp in 1975 and remained active in the business designing equipment until his death.

He leaves his wife of 63 years, Elizabeth Lyman; a son, James L. Warden, (wife Debra); daughters, Lindsay Coppinger (husband Roy) and Susan Groh, (husband Greg); grandchildren, Lyle, Lara, Erin Coppinger, Katherine Warden Dobric, Rachel Warden, Jennifer Groh Lederer, James Groh, Christie Groh LeVake; and five great-grandchildren.

His passion and purpose in life was to serve His Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. He supervised the building of East Glenville Church. He was a deacon and elder at East Glenville and 1st Presbyterian Churches. He taught men's bible classes, organized an area pastors group, and mentored many men over the years. He wrote hundreds of bible studies. He led his family well. He was a man highly respected and deeply loved.

Memorial services were at First Presbyterian Church on Union Street, Schenectady, N.Y., Friday, January 15.

Theresa (Fricke) Grimm sent us the following about her brother:

I wanted to let you know that my brother, Jim Fricke passed away September 27th of this year. He had a very rare form of cancer and even after a bone marrow transplant, he lost his battle. He and his wife Vicki had been married for 40 years and lived in Florida for many years. His remains will be scattered off the Great Wall in the Cayman Islands sometime in 2010. He was an avid diver and this is where he wanted his final resting place to be.

My husband **Gary Grimm** served with Jim on Bang (69-72) and it was through my brother that I met him— Gary was a cook and Jim a fire control technician.

When we were reading about **Henry** "**Poo**" **Conoly** in the last Newsletter, many memories came back and Gary and I thought we should let you know about Jim.

Gary and I are looking forward to seeing everyone at the Bang reunion next year. It's been too long and as we know, life is too short.

At the time of his death, he worked as the Manager of South Florida Sales for Presidio Networked Solutions. Jim's hobbies were many but his passions were photography and scuba diving.

One week out of the hospital and feeling really good. For those that weren't aware of what happened......It all started when they found blockage in two arteries to the heart. One was 99.9% blockage and the other was 80% blocked. Cleaned out the worst one and put in a drug eluding stint on Dec. 23.

I was scheduled for the second stint on Feb 9, but I came back to the VA on Jan 26 with bad chest pains. They did surgery on Jan 27 and put in the other stint. That night I had another minor attack so the next day they went in again for a look. All appeared fine and I went home on the 31st.

Went back to the VA on Feb 9. Heart, lungs, BP, weight, and oxygen all good. Don't have to go back now till April or May. Saw both Primary Care & Cardiologist.....both are pleased with my progress.

I can't say enough for the care I got at the Reno VA Hospital. They were amazing and the food was exceptional. I highly recommend the VA to everyone.

When is Summer going to get here.??? I'm sick of the cold weather and snow.

Kurt Cadenhead, son of **AI Cadenhead** sends us the following good news:

I'm sorry about my Dad not being in touch. I feel like you and the rest of the Bang Gang are an extended family to us. I am so amazed at the comraderie that you all share with each other.

Dad is a tough guy and he doesn't let on when something is wrong with him. He had a problem with blood clots in his legs and they migrated up into his lungs. He lost a lot of weight and his liver was shutting down before even I noticed that something was wrong. I finally made him go to the hospital where they admitted him right away. Fred Gers, a GunnersMate (45, WP6), "I have been wanting to write about my time on BANG but first, I will start with my enlisting in the Navy—I joined the Navy, January 1943.

I went thru boot camp at Bainbridge, MD and then on to Gunnery School. They quit giving rates instead you became a seaman first class. I passed a fleet exam and entered a prep school for the Academy. I had a high school sweetheart. We had broke up but when I was home on a weekend liberty my mother got us back together and we were married November 7, 1943. After that, I was dismissed from the prep school and assigned to the USS Otter DE210 at Charleston, SC. I was carried off the Otter with rheumatism and could not walk. After two months in the hospital and another month in one in CA, I was sent to a receiving ship in San Diego. From there to COMSUBPAC SW Pacific at Pearl Harbor. I was sent to various schools and then to Guam where I met BANG.

I reported to the XO officer on BANG and after a short interview he said, "*Gers, you never went to Sub School or volunteered. Do you want to come aboard?*" And so I joined a very elite group in March 1945 that I was, and still am, very proud of.

I made the sixth War Patrol on BANG. I had the 20 and the 40 to maintain. I would go topside and clean them, when we ran the surface at night to charge batteries. In June 1945 after I qualified thru the Boat, I made GM 3rd class. I then rode BANG back to the States to Portsmouth Navy Yard where she was overhauled and two 5 inch 25s were mounted fore and aft. I was discharged in November.

I was recalled in January 1951—I had forgotten I was still in the inactive reserve. I was assigned to USS Medregal (SS480) and applied for a hardship discharge which I got after serving only four months. I had opened up a service station in 1949 and while I was on the Medregal in warm and sunny Key West, my wife was in PA minding the store freezing her butt off pumping gas and washing windshields.

I will be 87 in March of this year and I lost my lovely wife this past November after 66 years of marriage. I look forward to receiving the Newsletter. The first thing I do is check to see who went on Eternal Patrol that I knew. I remember when I see their names but my memory as well as other things has deteriorated."....*Thanks, Fred for the interesting Bio.* We are sorry to hear that Honey has passed away and offer you our deepest condolences. If you are still able to get around, we would be happy to see you at our Reunion this year. It's close by in New London. Hope you can make it.

Crisogono Gurion, a StewardsMate (58-59), "This old shipmate of yours just turned 75 years young last November and I'm having a very sad and painful disease of the joints called Rheumatoid Arthritis. That is the reason I have not written you sooner because my fingers hurt. I have been receiving the Bang Gang Newsletter and enjoy reading them.

From time to time I go to the VA hospital to see if they can still overhaul this worn out body so I will be able to walk normal again. So far, I still can walk with a cane like "Bat Masterson".

You know time cannot erase the wonderful and good memories that I experienced on board the old SS385. Remember, you cooked the food and I

served it. That was a easy job. I was not satisfied with that kind of work but I was happy then.

When I swapped duty to go to Harder SS568 I was able to change my rate to Engineman. I left Harder an EN3(ss) and went to Hawaii on board Wahoo SS565—then to Tang SS563. That was during the Cuban Crisis. Next I went to Grayback LPSS574 where I made Chief. My next duty was Shipyard Repair Facility and then to the 7th Fleet Flagship, Blue Ridge LCC19. I wound up on some "Nuke" Boats before retiring from the Navy as an E-8, MMCS(ss). It was a long 30 years.

This worn out body was still strong so I went to work for the US Dept of Transportation as a mechanic. I worked another 16 years and 8 months with them before retiring fully in 2004. The bad part is I'm now back where I started—washing dishes, because my wife and I are the only two left in our house.


I married a very beautiful girl who was dedicated to home and family and we raised 5 kids with the incessant blessings of GOD to guide us.

I pray that the VA therapy will help get rid of your arthritic pain so you can enjoy the rest of your life.

Claire and I are excited about bringing this year's reunion back to the New London/Groton area and we expect a large group of shipmates in attendance.

Our headquarters will be the Radisson Hotel in New London (radisson.com/newlondonct). It is a 100% non-smoking facility and is located just blocks from New London's train station, ferries, and BANK ST so, you'll have a chance to visit your old haunts (if they are still there).

The hotel has blocked off 60 rooms for us until 30 days before the reunion. After that time all unreserved rooms will be released to the public so call in your reservations early. The price for a double is \$89 plus tax and this rate is good for 3 days before and after the reunion for those who wish to extend their stay. We couldn't match the room price Gene Lockwood got for Virginia Beach, but we think you will get your money's worth. Standard amenities, such as coffee makers, hair dryers, irons/ ironing boards and complimentary high-speed wireless Internet access and weekday newspapers are included with all rooms. A heated indoor pool and a workout room is also available to all guests.

At the time of check-in, you may purchase coupons for a <u>full</u> breakfast buffet for two for \$15. The regular price is \$12.95 per person. If you do not want to purchase the full breakfast buffet, you can still order from the menu.

We have three bus trips planned for your enjoyment.

On **Tuesday, Sept 28th** we will leave the hotel at 9:30 and travel to Stoney Creek. Once there, we will transfer to a school bus shuttle that will take us to the dock where we board the boat for a 45 minute cruise around the Thimble Islands in Long Island Sound (**thimbleislands.com**). Interesting stories about the buildings and residents living there will be narrated during the tour. Then, returning to our bus, we will motor to Griswold Inn (**Griswoldinn.com**) in the picturesque town of Essex for lunch and a little site-seeing before returning to New London at 2:30.

Wednesday, Sept 29 we will leave the hotel at 9:45 (subject to change) to tour the Sub Base in the morning, and after lunch at the Base galley there will be free time to tour the Nautilus Museum before returning.

For those that are flying, the closest commercial airfield is Green Airport in Providence, RI. Since this is over an hour's drive away, we are looking into the possibility of using the Radisson van for pick-up and return. The cost would be cheaper than hiring a taxi or renting a car. If you would be interested in this service please indicate so on the Registration Form and fill in your flight information.

If we can get several couples arriving and departing within a reasonable time frame, we will make the arrangements with the Hotel otherwise, we will make some other kind of arrangement for you.

As an alternative to flying, you may want to consider traveling by rail. Our Hotel is only a couple of blocks from the railroad station and Amtrak makes frequent stops there daily.


