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

KARL L. EVANS, aka "Subs Evans", died peacefully Wednesday, March 7, 2012, in Nashville, after a short illness. Born April 8, 1926, in Poyen, Ark., the oldest of 11 children born to Karl M. and Ollie Evans. He graduated high school in Vivian, LA. He served 20 years in the Navy on many submarines. Karl received his Dolphins on the USS Porpoise SS 172 in 1945. In addition to Porpoise he served on Nautilus SS 168, Bowfin SS 287, Sablefish SS 303, Tang SS 563, Bang SS 385, Runner SS 476, Nautilus SSN 571, Skipjack SSN 585, and finished on the USS Ethan Allen SSBN 608 as chief petty officer in 1963. His next endeavor was a supervisor's job at Electric Boat. Karl was an avid gardener and active in the Sub Vet's organizations.

He is survived by his wife, Helen (Nieto); three daughters and their families, Karlee and Mark Slaper with daughters, Jessica and Lauren, Charlene Christian and daughters, Michelle and Stacey, Sherryl Smith and her children, Amanda and Chad; and two great-grandchildren, Kali and Myles.

Karl was cremated in Tennessee. His ashes will be buried at sea with full military honors. A memorial will be held at a later time by the family.

Ed Gandy was one of my mentors aboard BANG. One of so many WWII submariners who wound up in the latter years of their careers delegated to teaching a newer generation how to operate the weaponry they had so masterfully handled during the war. Ed was a good teacher and a good shipmate. He always took joy in relating his WWII experience aboard Finback when they rescued a downed pilot who later became our 41st President and then later on in life becoming the President's neighbor in Maine and never missing the chance to remind him who saved his butt.

I am grateful to our Reunions for reuniting Ed and I and extending the friendship we had aboard BANG to the present.



EDWARD J. GANDY, 86, formerly of 101 Ipswich Drive, died peacefully Sunday evening, March 11th, in Hospice House of Vero Beach, FL, with his daughter at his side.

He was born in Winchendon, MA on December 10, 1925, the son of the late Matthew and Mary Frances (O'Hara) Gandy and lived in

Winchendon until moving to Vero Beach this past fall.

Ed worked as a design engineer for Honeywell from 1972 to 1984. He then worked for Madison Wire and Cable in Worcester for twelve years until his retirement in 1996. He enjoyed deep sea fishing and was an avid collector of coins.

A career Navy man, Ed spent most of his time serving on submarines covering three war era's, WWII, Korea and Vietnam, and was a qualified deep sea diver. He served as a torpedoman on USS Bang and USS Finback. While on the Finback patrolling off the Japanese Island of Chichi-Jima, his sub rescued downed pilot Lt. George Herbert Walker Bush, later becoming our 41st President, just four hours before Japanese fish boats could reach him. While serving, his submarines sank a total of 18 enemy ships.

Locally, Ed was loved and respected by all, who knew him. Ed was a 50 year member of Eugene M. Connor Post 193 and was very instrumental in the formation of the Sons Squadron at the He would often serve as chaplain, Legion. visiting sick members and participating in military ceremonies. Proud of his service, he spoke each year to 7th and 8th grade students about his times on the submarine. At the Legion facility, there is a corner, known as "Ed Gandy Corner", where there are several pictures and commendations from President Bush and others, of Ed. In his later years, when he needed his walker to navigate, he was fondly nicknamed "Fast Eddie."

Ed was a member of The Winchendon Lions Club, Artisan Lodge of Masons, The Forty & Eight Organization of the American Legion, Winchendon Rod and Gun Club (where he always donated each year to its Annual Children's Fishing Derby), VFW Post 6997 in York, Maine and St. Paul's Episcopal Church. He was also a life member of Lt. Frederick Wilder White Post 2158 VFW and a member of the Elks in York, Maine. Ed was a former member the Winchendon Historical Society and the Bingo Committee at the Legion. Ed enjoyed dancing to the big band sound, such as jitter bugging, playing cribbage and hunting for deer in his younger days. Ed was a lifelong fan of the New York Yankees.

His wife of 52 years, Mary Ann (Lemire) Gandy, died in 2002. He leaves two children, Jane E. Draeger and her husband, Kenneth of Vero Beach, FL and David M. Gandy of Winchendon and a granddaughter, Gretchen J. Draeger; a cousin, Betty Ashmore of Winchendon, as well as nephews and nieces. He was predeceased by his brothers and sisters, Alice Conway, Edith Gandy, Margaret Columbus, Charles Gandy, and Matthew Gandy.

A full military service and burial was held in Riverside Cemetery.

Anne Dockery, widow of Bill Dockery, an Electronics Tech (52-54) ComCrew3, "Thank you so much for taking the time to re-send the Bang Newsletter to me at my new address.

I've actually been at the new address for over a year but, with the post office forwarding the newsletter from my old address, I just didn't realize that I had never sent you my change of address. Sorry about that. Actually it was a good thing because it woke me up to the fact that I never sent you a check for the Slush Fund which I had intended to do for a long time.

I love reading the newsletter because it reminds me how much my husband enjoyed it. Bill has been on Eternal Patrol for 13 years and it's hard to believe. When we joined the Gang for its Reunion in Portsmouth, NH in October 1993, Bill was walking fine and it was I who was using a cane to walk with as I awaited my first hip replacement that November. But, within the next 6 months, Bill was hit with Multiple System Atrophy (MSA) and within one year he was totally bedridden for 3 1/2 years not being able to move a muscle or talk.

It's pretty unexplainable what life has in store for us. Bill was the healthy one for 65 years—never sick. I, on the other side of the coin, have had many operations because of Arthritis. And yet, now with Osteoporosis, I'm still here and dancing Ballroom 2 or 3 times a month. So, we must enjoy every day GOD gives us.

Out of the 4 Boats that Bill was on in his 20 years of service, BANG is the only one that keeps in touch with its family. You do a fantastic job in keeping up the great connection of old shipmates and their families."... Thanks Anne for your donation and detail about the cause of Bill's demise. Certainly a heart wrenching time for all involved. I attended the Portsmouth Reunion also and probably met you and Bill there but was too involved in trying to remember the shipmates I served aboard with. I was happy to read that you referred to us as "family" as I too feel that the Bang Gang are more than just shipmates and that our annual get togethers are not Boat reunions but Family reunions. As you said, our future will always

remain a mystery so we continue on by remembering the past and enjoying the present the best we can and keep on dancing....

Lenny Scuito, a QuarterMaster (69-71), "I am attaching a letter about our retired members health plans (if you use them) that directly impacts all of us. This letter is from the Tricare/ US Family Health Plan in my geographical area. But it applies to all areas. If you have not gotten a letter like this, I strongly suggest you contact either your Tricare Group or your US Family Health Plan Group to determine and ensure your coverage. I was told, last year, that the government was pushing to eliminate both of these and force all of us retired military types to use Medicare as our primary with no secondary. If this had happened, any secondary benefits package chosen by the retiree, would have been paid for out of their own pocket. Needless to say, the thousands of letters sent to Congressionals and the five military services did make a difference."

Due to changes in the Department of Defense budget, after September 30, 2012, military retirees 65 or older will not be able to enroll in any TRICARE Prime option, including the US Family Health Plan. In addition, anyone joining the US Family Health Plan after September 30, 2012, will be disenrolled from the plan upon reaching age 65.

Let me reassure you that you and/or your family will not be affected by the change. Anyone who is enrolled in the US Family Health Plan on September 30, 2012, is "grandfathered." That means you may stay in the plan regardless of your age.

Thanks to the letters that thousands of our members sent to Washington last year, we were able to preserve your access to the US Family Health Plan. You may remain a US Family Health Plan member as long as you stay continuously enrolled.

Even if this change does not affect you, I'd like to ask for your help. Please help us spread the word throughout the military community.

Our best efforts are never as good as word of mouth. If you have family members, friends, neighbors, or coworkers who are eligible for TRICARE but are not members of the US Family Health Plan, tell them about this timelimited opportunity to get a great health plan for life. They should be aware that the new law restricts their future TRICARE options. However, if they become members of the US Family Health by September 30, 2012, they'll have a high-quality health plan they can keep.



Ed Note: While we are on the subject of benefit intrusion by the boys in Washingtoon, here is a couple more areas under attack.

Commissary & Exchange Elimination: Those authorized to shop in these two venues saved nearly \$5 billion last year. It is one of the most utilized and beneficial benefits earned by those on active duty and retired. Not only do they save a substantial amount of money, they contribute to improvement of the commissary system. because for almost 60 years, Congress has required commissaries to collect a surcharge on purchases to make them more self-sustaining. "Every time our customers shop at the commissary, they are not only saving money because we sell at cost, but they are also taking care of their own," said Joseph H. Jeu, DeCA director and CEO. "Their purchases help improve commissary facilities for their brothers and sisters in uniform." The surcharge, which has been set at 5 percent for the past 28 years, is used to build replacement stores, renovate and repair existing stores, and purchase equipment such as freezers and cash registers. Even with the surcharge, customers still enjoy an average of 32 percent or more in savings. The Armed Forces Marketing Council and the American Logistics Association have gotten together and have started a website where you can join the Coalition to help save these valuable benefits. Your help is needed to show those members of Congress that the Commissary and Exchange are very valuable benefits that need to be preserved.

In an unrelated intrusion into the military community's benefits the Directorate of Family and

Morale, Welfare and Recreation at Fort Myer, VA, recently announced an exception to policy that non-Department of Defense allows federal employees residing in proximity to Joint Base Myer-Henderson Hall to use bowling center, club pools and tennis courts, as well as access to dining at the clubs or picnic areas, wedding packages and special event equipment rental, including grills and tents. Non-DoD federal employees still must provide proper identification and their official ID cards for entry. This wrongheaded decision severely waters down the benefits earned for a career in the military. It forces active duty troops, retirees and survivors to compete with many more civilians for spots in the gym, pool and other scarce MWR resources elsewhere on base. 




