That H-2 is the Helo that I flew while on deployment in the Med on the USS Belknap, CG-26 Dec 71 to May 72. We had a diesel boat with us for a short while, the Clamagore. This was the first cruise in the US Navy for the new LAMPS MK I ASW system, we were HC-4 LAMPS Det 1 on that cruise. After that cruise was over I went to Naples, Italy for 3 years on the COMFAIRMED Staff.

Charles Robert Tucker served aboard USS Saury (SS189) and USS Golet (SS361) before reportina aboard BANG on 12/14/1944 as a LTjg. He was aboard for BANG's 5th and 6th War Patrols and then brought her back to Portsmouth, NH for repairs. He then rode BANG to the Panama Canal for about a year before returning with her to New London for decommissioning. Charles

disembarked BANG on 8/19/1946. I was unable to locate an obituary for Charles on line but I did have a nice phone conversation with his wife, Saribiron.

Guy Keemer, a SN, boarded BANG from the Relief Crew in Pearl Harbor, HI on 3/27/1944 as she was preparing to depart on her 1st Patrol. He disembarked on 6/5/1944 just before her 2nd Patrol. Guy went on to serve aboard USS Pintado (SS387), USS Skipjack (SS184), USS Captaine (AGSS336), and USS Bergall (SS320).



Guy C. Keemer passed away in his 88th year Saturday, December 22, 2012. funeral service will be private. Interment will be in Fort Indiantown Gap National Cemetery, The John W. Annville. Keffer Funeral Homes and Crematory, Inc. 902 Mt. Rose Ave., is assisting the family. Mr. Keemer was the son of the late Guy C., Sr., and Bertha (Landis)

Keemer. He is survived by his wife of 42 years, Lucille A. (Kline) Keemer of Hallam; a son Howard Hergen-rother of Holidaysburg; a daughter, Dana Wenrich and her husband, Ken of York; a granddaughter, Siri Wenrich of Baltimore; a grandson, Bradley Wenrich of York; a niece, Sharon Ream of Hallam; a nephew, Charles Ream of Windsor; and numerous other nieces and nephews. He was preceded in death by two sisters, Betty Wilson and Nancy Ream. Guy was a well-known Antique Dealer with customers up and down the Eastern Seaboard. At age six he accompanied his dad to sales and spent his allowance on an object he then sold through his dad's antique shop. continued to do so throughout his twenty years in the U.S. Navy Submarine division, buying mainly in New England and Philadelphia. Retiring from the Navy in 1963, he opened a shop in Hallam. Memorial contributions may be made to SPCA 3159 Susquehanna Trail North, York, PA 17406.

Bob White started his outstanding Submarine career by completing ELEVEN War Patrols aboard USS Drum (SS228). He then served aboard USS Shad (SS235), USS Cutlass (SS478), USS Finback (SS230), USS Torsk (SS423), and USS Sea Leopard (SS483) before reporting aboard BANG on 10/04/1952 as an ENC and putting her back into commission for a third time. Bob was COB when I embarked BANG fresh out of Sub School and I couldn't have ask for a better mentor to kick start my service in submarines. After six months of me in the Topside Gang, Bob decided he needed a change so

on 9/25/1956 he transferred to USS Muskellunge (SS262) and later finished out his career aboard USS Grenadier (SS525).



Robert E. White, 95, passed away peacefully in his sleep, Dec. 8, 2012. Bob was born in Philadelphia, PA on Sept. 16, 1917 to the late Grace Holt and Robert W. White.

Bob enlisted in the US Navy immediately after the bombing of Pearl

Harbor. He had a distinguished 30 year career in the submarine service, rising to the rank of LCDR. He was especially proud of his tour of duty aboard the USS Drum (SS-228) during the war, where he earned the Silver Star.

He is preceded in death by his first wife, Dorothy "Dot" White, and his second wife, Marie White. Survivors include his daughter, Carol Kramer of Norfolk; three step-children, Barbara Hope Smith of CA, Sue Sunseri (John) of CA, and Hal Spindel (Lynn) of HI; siblings, Elmer Duckinfield, Elsie Smart (Don), and Peg Neidig, all of PA; and many loving friends, relatives and neighbors.

A memorial service was held Dec. 14, at Smith & Williams Funeral Home, Norfolk Chapel. Submarine Veterans Inc. performed their funeral ritual during the service. Internment will be at Arlington National Cemetery at a later date.

Sam Wallace was a SDC when he transferred from ComSubDiv 101 to BANG on 11/01/1960 at of the tail end prominent Submarine career. He started his service serving aboard (SS65) two "O" Boats, and then (SS67) before riding USS Mingo (SS261) for six of her Patrols. His career then

continued on aboard USS Bashaw (AGSS241), USS Chopper (SS342), and USS Hardhead (SS365) before being assigned to BANG where he completed his career. On 5/31/1962 he was

transferred to the Sub Base Separation Center for processing.

Sam Wesley Wallace, 89, of Fort Dodge, passed away peacefully on Monday, November 26, 2012, at Trinity Regional Medical Center. Funeral services were at the Gunderson Funeral Chapel with Chaplin (Maj) Michael Crawford officiating. Entombment was in the mausoleum at North Lawn Cemetery with full military honors conducted by the United States Navy and the VFW Post #1856.

Sam is survived by his three sons, Michael (Barbara) Weston of San Francisco, CA Clifford Weston of Decatur, IA and Steven Wallace of Los Angeles, CA; and four grandchildren. Sam is preceded in death by his wife, Dorothy on February 2, 1984; his parents, Sam and Carrie Wallace and all of his nine siblings. Sam Wesley Wallace a native of Little Rock, Arkansas, was born on December 16, 1922. He joined the United States Navy on September 9, 1940, being signed in by his father at the age of seventeen. Sam was a submariner in which his first time under the water was in a World War I relic which was called a "rust bucket." By the time Sam retired in June of 1962, the Navy had large nuclear submarines. Sam went on six war patrols in the Pacific Ocean aboard the submarine USS Mingo and is featured in the book, "Black Submariners in the United States Navy, 1940-1975." Sam retired from the Navy as a Chief Steward, E-7.

He and his family, wife Dorothy, and their three sons Michael, Clifford and Steven moved to Fort Dodge, Iowa for three and a half years before more opportunities relocated the family to Connecticut where Sam worked for General Dynamics, Pratt and Whitney, and ultimately for Pfizer Chemical Corporation for 17 years.

Sam's second retirement in 1983 brought him and his wife back to Fort Dodge while their grown sons relocated to California. Sam was an avid golfer who achieved 4 Holes-In-One starting at the age of 72 through 82 at Lakeside Municipal Golf Course. Sam was a current member of the VFW Post #1856. Sam will forever be remembered as a fun loving man who made everyone feel special. Sam was always full of jokes but with the jokes came an appreciation of life and living it in the fullest of ways. Sam was selected in April of 2010, by the Brushy Creek Area Honor Flight to travel to Washington DC to view the National World War II Memorial.



Orville Horton was a member of BANG's 3rd Commissioning Crew. He reported aboard on 10/04/1952 from USS Chivo (SS341) and served as a RM3. About four months later he transferred to USS San Pablo (AGS30).



Orville Eugene Horton, age 80, passed away Tuesday, March 5, 2013. He was born January 28, 1933 in Portsmouth, Ohio to the late Elmer and Lillian (Artis) Louis. Gene was a retired City of Columbus Police Lieutenant and was previously employed with S.T.R.S.as an Office their Manager in accounting department. He was also a member of

V.F.W. Post 8198, a member of the U.S. Submarine Veterans, and American Legion Post 532. In addition to his parents, he is preceded in death by his wife Catherine (Close) Horton and siblings Richard, Earl, Ernetta Harris, and Joyce Everett. Orville is survived by children, Catherine (Donald) Gray, Sandra (Jack) Davies, Judy (Robert) Ewing, Jeri (Rick) Hanson, Joseph Eugene (Amy) Horton, and Sharon Evans; 14 grandchildren; 15 greatgrandchildren; and many nieces, nephews, and dear friends. Len Sciuto - Back Surgery / Tumor Removal, Shortly after returning home from last year's Reunion, Len went to the doctor with back pain. First, they had to stabilize the spine and the remaining part of the L4 vertebrae using rods, pins. Then, the following week they removed what was left of the L4 vertebrae and all of the tumor and then inserted a grafted piece of femur bone into its place and fused the spine at that location. The surgeons declared the surgery successful. Despite some small setbacks, Len is now in rehab and is expected to be home in a couple of weeks.

Ray Olszewski, a YeomaN (66), "I was Boat Yeoman for a short time in 1966. I was assigned to BANG after a tour of duty at the American Embassy in Djakarta, Indonesia where I was assigned to the Naval Attache Staff for one and a half years. When I reported to the BANG, Roger Betts was the Executive Officer. The only person's names I remember was Betts and Billy Cromie. I may have told you this before, but I was part of the crew who rented out someone's home in Westport, CT. I think there were about a dozen of us. The house was huge and right on Long Island Sound. Those were great days.

I made one cruise to the Caribbean on BANG stopping in Puerto Rico. While there, four of us got together to make a foursome to play golf at Chi Chi Rodriguez' course, El Dorado. Afterwards, we were invited to have drinks at a wedding reception. One of the crew members won a lot of money at the Casino. I want to say \$25K and he kept it in a safe in the Yeoman Shack until we got back to New London. I also remember spending an evening in one of the Bars there and haggling with the local gals about how much for a 'quickie'. We'd say how much and she would say - \$5 and \$2 meaning \$5 for her and \$2 for the room - we'd fire back, No. \$4 and \$3? Well, we kept that going until she finally caught on and we escaped from catching anything else - if you know what I mean?

I remember another incident at a local bar in New London. We were at the bar having a beer and some dude from another boat didn't like the way I looked, so he said, and punched me, knocking me off the bar stool. About the time it took for me to get up, he was pounced on by a bunch of BANG crew who dragged him outside and proceeded to beat him up - telling him at the same time "No one hits our Boat Yeoman." I think **Cromie** was there as part of the group that dragged the assailant outside.

I was pulled off of the Boat with orders to go to

COMSUBLANT because they needed a Yeoman (Intel Specialist) who was eligible for a security clearance. I left BANG and checked in at SUBLANT and was told that my orders were changed to report to CINCLANTFLT. They were senior to SUBLANT so, I lost my sub pay when that happened.

Diesel Fuel? Who Woulda Thunk It.....

For years veterans have been filing claims with the VA over the damage done to their health by their exposure to Agent Orange. Disability awards have been granted to many of these claims for various reasons. One of these being **Bladder Cancer**.

If you have Bladder Cancer but were not exposed to Agent Orange you may now still have a claim due to a recent court ruling that states "The Board finds that the criteria for service connection for bladder cancer, as due to Agent Orange exposure and/or diesel fuel exposure, is granted."

It seems to me that anyone who served aboard Diesel Boats would meet this criteria because of their exposure AND confinement to diesel fumes - especially EN's.






