

When the last Newsletter I mailed to **Joe Minior**, TM (44-46, WP3,4,5,6), was returned to me stamped "*Unable to deliver, No Forwarding Address*", I did some searching on the Internet and found his obituary from 2013.

Joe boarded BANG as a Torpedoman just before she left on her 3rd Patrol in August 1944 and stayed until his discharge in February 1946. During the 2004 Taunton, MA Reunion I was fortunate to join some of Joe's WWII shipmates for a visit at Joe's home.

Joseph Minior, age 88, of Somerset, MA passed



away Wednesday, January 30, 2013 at his residence surrounded by his family. He was the husband of Esther (O'Gara) Minior to whom he has been married for the past 64 years.

Born in Fall River, a son of the late John Minior Sr. and Bridget (Pawlikowska) Minior, he was a lifelong area resident.

A veteran of the United States Navy, he served during World War II as a Torpedo Man 3rd class. He worked at the Newport Naval Base in the maintenance department for the Housing Division for 40 years before retiring in 1986.

He was a communicant of St. Stanislaus Church in Fall River where he was a Eucharistic Minister and a member of the Holy Rosary Society and the St. Stanislaus Seniors. He also served as a Eucharistic Minister at St. Anne's Hospital.

degree in Electrical Engineering. Later he attended Northeastern University in Boston, MA and earned a degree in Industrial Engineering, followed by a Masters degree in Business from Lesley College in Cambridge, MA. Dick was a pioneer in the field of Quality Management and Control. He is a respected Fellow member of the American Society of Quality (ASQ) and has written many innovative books and training materials on quality control Fellow Membership is an honor management. bestowed by other ASQ Members. A Fellow represents the upper echelon of the quality profession and serves as the backbone of the ASQ. Dick was a lifelong teacher and worked as a Senior Graduate Lecturer in the Masters Degree program in the College of Professional Studies at Northeastern University. Dick was well known as an entrepreneur and was the founder and President of both The Quality Improvement Network and Barbieri Quality Registrars where he helped hundreds of companies

Dick was a source of great inspiration and provided many with loving & wise advice and guidance.

Services were held at Silas F. Richardson & Son Funeral Home 106 West Street, Leominster, MA followed by a burial with military honors in Evergreen Cemetery, 357 Main Street, Leominster. Floyd came aboard BANG out of Sub School in April 1960 and served as a CS until transferring to Patrick Henry SSBN599 in February 1961 where he spent the next 9 1/2 years. I recall Floyd telling me that shipmate **Jim Bunch** gave him the nickname "Sarge" and that stuck with him throughout his service career.



Floyd E. Gardinier, 89, passed away Tuesday (Jan 27th) at the Edward L. Wilkinson RHCF.

Born in Amsterdam on June 9, 1926 to the late Edgar and Ethel Herrick Gardinier, Floyd was united in marriage to Dora Mae Roberts in 1948 and who passed away in 1999. They had one son

Bruce R. Gardinier who passed away in October of 2010.

Floyd attended Greater Amsterdam Schools and then enlisted in the Navy in 1943 until 1946 at which time he joined the Reserves and received his high school diploma as a promise to his mother.

In 1959 he re-enlisted with the Navy and attended submarine school in New London Ct. He served aboard the USS Bang, USS Patrick Henry and the USS Robert E. Lee. He retired from the USS George Marshall in 1976. During his 33 year career he underwent 23 Polaris/ Poseidon patrols, an extraordinary accomplishment. After retirement Floyd worked for the Amsterdam Bus Service, driving and training.

He was a member of the VFW Post 8690 of Broadalbin, a former member of BPO Elks Lodge 101, Cub Scouts and Boy Scouts, Commanding Officer of the Amsterdam Naval Cadets and the United Presbyterian Church.

He is survived by his grandson Jason Gardinier, granddaughter Kelly (Scott) Carney and great grandchildren Kayden, Brody, Peyton and Brayden. He is also survived by his sisters Marjorie Dunlavey of Tribes Hill, Norma Murphy of Syracuse and Hazel Roberts of Peoria Az.; along with nieces, nephews and cousins. He was predeceased by brothers Harlow and Richard Gardinier.

The doctors were very generous with their estimate because before I could get this edition to the printers, Dallas' daughter Trisia e-mailed me about his passing.

Dallas came aboard BANG out of Sub School in 1962 and served as a MachinistMate until his departure in 1965. He was also a crewmember of a North Atlantic cruise under **Captain Alex Sinclair**. A few years back, he announced the publishing of two "Miss Nancy" books - stating that the first one was dedicated to his BANG Shipmates.

Dallas Dixon, 72, of Waterloo, died peacefully with

He was born on Dec. 18, 1942 in Grundy Center, Iowa, son of Arnold and Dorthea (Hansen) Dixon.

Dallas graduated from Grundy Center High School in 1961. He served in the US Navy on the USS Bang Submarine in the Atlantic. He married Rita Palmitessa March 26, 1966 He became licensed in the State of Iowa for land surveying in 1985. Dallas worked as a land surveyor for Wayne Claassen Engineering and Survey Co., retired in 1999. He was a member of Land Surveyors of Iowa.

Dallas was an artistic person: making many fine pieces of stained glass lamps and windows, building cabinets and furniture, and published author of three novels and wrote his autobiography, "My First Sixty Years." He hand-bound and sewed each book, which took many precious hours. There wasn't an instrument he couldn't learn to play. Most importantly, he was an excellent husband, father, and grandfather, leaving wonderful memories.

Dallas is survived by: his wife, daughters Trisia (Jesse) McElmury and Dawn (Jonny) Silk, both of Farmington, MN, three grandchildren: Jordan Bradfield, Sydney (Brandon) Cole, and Sammantha Silk; brother Don (Jan) Dixon of Cedar Falls. He was preceded in death by his parents.



The Museum might not have come into existence if Berry's sister, Ester had not maintained an office at Hitsville U.S.A. after the headquarters moved to Los Angeles in 1972.
